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Good afternoon,

Thank you for taking the time to read my newsletter.

I would like to begin by saying shanah tovah to all my Jewish constituents and I hope that you have a happy New Year.

After a busy summer of supporting constituents with casework, the last few weeks in Parliament have been very eventful and I was pleased to be reappointed by Keir Starmer as Shadow Economic Secretary to the Treasury, so I can continue to develop Labour's plans for the City.

One of the issues that has taken up a lot of time this month has been the crisis of the presence of reinforced autoclaved aerated concrete (RAAC) in schools across the country. Unfortunately, the start of the new school year was chaotic and full of uncertainty for schools as many were asked to close just days before the start of term. I wrote to the Secretary of State of Education as well as all schools in Hampstead and Kilburn to ask for further clarity on the situation, and to offer any support to local schools. Fortunately, all schools in my constituency were able to open as scheduled, but I will be keeping a close eye on this issue locally and pressing the Government for action.

I would like to say thank you to all the teaching staff who dealt with the RAAC crisis so calmly and ensured that children and parents did not go through too much uncertainty. At the same time, we have also had A level results day recently. A huge congratulations to all those who have received their exam results this Summer - you have been through an incredible amount over the last few years, and I am always so impressed by the strength you have all shown in difficult times. Thank you also to the local school staff, parents, and carers who have supported children taking exams.

I have been to some fantastic events in the constituency this month, and a particular highlight was the celebrations on a car-free West End Lane as West Hampstead Amenity and Transport (WHAT) marked their 50th anniversary over the weekend. They do such fantastic work in standing up for the area and listening to the concerns of residents. Here's to another 50 years! You can read on to find out more about some of the other events I've attended, like the brilliant York Rise Street Party in Dartmouth Park and the licensing of the new Vicar of Emmanuel Church in West Hampstead.

I have also spent a lot of time recently talking about local and national issues in the media. Last week, I spoke to Times Radio, Sky News, LBC Radio and others about Labour's plans for the economy and the Prime Minister's shameful backtrack on this country's commitment to reaching net zero. I then went onto ITV's Peston where I was joined by Georgia Harrison, who is a powerful campaigner against violence towards women. It was fantastic to speak with her in the green room and to hear more about the inspirational work she does. I've also been busy writing articles in various newspapers and journals. If you are interested, here are some examples of some of this work:

- I commented in <u>the Guardian</u> about Labour's plans to unlock billions of private sector investment through our national wealth fund.

- I also spoke to Katy Balls for an episode of her podcast <u>Women with Balls</u>, speaking about what motivates me and my work to retain what was the most marginal seat in the country.

## Raising crime in Kilburn with the Government

There has unfortunately been a shocking rise in violence and crime in Kilburn, particularly on Kilburn High Road, where there have been some horrific stabbings and a sharp increase in shoplifting. On one occasion when I raised these incidents with the police, they said that they received 1,000 calls per day from Central North London alone, which was putting huge pressure on stretched resources.

Nobody should feel unsafe in their community, and I am worried that if this is left unchecked, more and more people will be concerned for their safety in the area. It is also frightening for the staff and customers in shops who should not be having to deal with crime, violence and abuse.

I <u>told the Government in parliament</u> that they need to better resource the police, and make reducing all crime, including retail crime, a priority.



## Campaigning against sewage in our waterways

We have heard too many stories over the past couple of years about sewage being released into places where people swim and where our water comes from. In 2022 alone, there were 824 sewage dumps a day across the country, yet, sadly, the Government have decided to reject the Office for Environmental Protection's findings that they may have broken the law over sewage dumping in our waterways and refused to work with them to deal with this increasingly serious issue.

It is deeply concerning that the Government are not listening to the Office for Environmental Protection on this and <u>I raised this point</u> directly with the Minister in Parliament.



## **Attending the York Rise Street Party**

I had <u>a fabulous afternoon</u> at the York Rise Street Party in Dartmouth Park earlier this month. The community came out in force to show what fantastic local spirit there is in the area. It was great to

be there alongside my colleagues Ed Miliband MP, Anne Clarke AM and the local Highgate councillors Anna Wright and Camron Aref-Adib. I had some great conversations with local residents at the stands for Brookfield Primary School, Dartmouth Park Neighbourhood Forum, Friends of Highgate Library, Home Start, Streets Kitchen, and other great community organisations.

Thank you to everyone who was involved in organising the party, and to all the local residents and businesses who took part.



## Speaking in Parliament about LGBTQ hate crime

I am really worried about the sharp rise in LGBTQ hate crimes that we have seen in recent years, including many shocking incidents in my constituency.

This year, Rainbow Europe announced that the UK had fallen to 17th place in terms of safety for LGTBQ people. Nine years ago, it was 1st. In Hampstead and Kilburn alone over the last few years, we have seen a gay couple brutally attacked by a group on a bus after being taunted with offensive questions about their sexuality and I've heard from so many constituents who have faced appalling abuse, intimidation and harassment for being in public with their partners.

At a Westminster Hall debate this month on LGBTQ abuse in social care settings, <u>I raised with the Government the urgent need</u> to tackle this horrific kind of abuse and for cowardly crimes that target LGBTQ people to be given tougher sentences as a priority.



## Stopping a constituent's extradition to Russia

I dealt with an <u>extraordinary case</u> recently of a constituent with refugee status in this country, who was nearly extradited to Russia after travelling to Italy with his refugee travel papers. On trying to return to the UK via Palermo airport, he was arrested and threatened with being sent back to Russia, from where he had fled following significantly traumatic experiences at the hands of the regime.

There was great concern as the UK Government had said that it does not provide consular assistance to refugees. I wrote to the Foreign Office immediately requesting further assistance in this case, and, fortunately, my constituent was allowed to return to the UK and to his life here after much distress. I have tabled Parliamentary Questions to the Government about the issues surrounding consular protection in this case, and I will be watching this issue closely and keep pushing the Government to provide the maximum possible consular protections for those who live in this country.


It was brilliant to spend some time with both people who are supported by the charity and some of the trustees. I will continue to support Changing Faces and the brilliant work they do.
